# Important Open House on the 145<sup>th</sup> St. Corridor

145th Street (SR 523) runs between Shoreline and Seattle and is a major east-west travel corridor connecting north King County with Aurora Ave. (SR 99), Lake City Way (SR 522), and a future light rail station. 145th Street has significant traffic congestion, higher-than-average collision rates, a poor pedestrian environment, no designated bike facilities, and limited bus service. The need for improvements has existed for some time and will only increase in the future. The project team has developed draft study concepts with input from the community and project stakeholders that serve as bookends for the kinds of improvements that could be made. The project team looks forward to hearing from you.
