The Year in Review

2008 has been a year of increased involvement of the BNA in the wider communities of the City of Shoreline, our schools, the County, and the State.

- We had a fun neighborhood anniversary party with live music and dancing.
- The 32nd Legislative District held its delegate convention here. There was a high level of participation.
- We are involved with the Sub Area Plan for future development south of 150th Street. The Citizens' Advisory Committee meets on the 1st and 3rd Tuesdays.
- Many of us spoke at the Fircrest Master Planning meetings this year to support community use of the excess property and to preserve the land in its natural environment for the continued use by Fircrest residents. I represented you on the Public Health Lab Risk Assessment Stakeholder group.
- Neighbors came to a class by Jim Diers on Asset Based Community Development. One result of that was many more block parties this year.
- We helped Prince of Peace host Tent City 3 this summer. Many of them still come every Wednesday at 5-6:30 for POPY's community dinner.
- We worked together with local churches and PTSA's to weed and clean up the school grounds at Briarcrest, Kellogg and Shorecrest in the September Embrace Shoreline Schools event.
- I represent you on the Long-Range Financial Planning Citizen's Advisory Committee meeting the 2nd and 4th Thursdays.
- We are often represented at Parks Board, Planning Commission, City Council and Council of Neighborhoods.

All of this participation by neighbors has increased our social capital. Not to take any credit from our hard working teachers and their students, but as predicted by Robert Putnam, when social capital increases school achievement improves. Our Briarcrest Elementary School won State wide recognition for improving test scores.

The tears I saw on the television during Election Day brought my memories to 1963 when I first came to the US with a big dream. I saw people saying joyfully "I never thought this will happen in my life time." Memories went back to Washington D.C. when I witnessed the funeral of J. F. Kennedy. I also watched Martin Luther King, Jr.'s Civil Rights Movement speech.

I am delighted for the change in our government. I hope our new leaders on both sides and in the middle, all people, young and old, poor and rich, all join hands in this crucial time.

Another flag from my past is the Lebanese flag; a flag that formed my youth and brought memories to my heart, it embodied the everlasting Cedar tree mentioned in the bible.

My feelings went to my youthful days growing up on the shores of my own hometown Byblos, the ancient Phoenician city on the Mediterranean. At that time, Lebanon was considered to be "Switzerland of the Middle East".

During my recent visit in 2008 to Lebanon I saw the country shattered and ruined by civil war, bad economy, poverty and corruption. I was sad. I prayed for miracles and before my departure I witnessed a new elected president for Lebanon who happened to be from Byblos my hometown. My idealistic dream is back with an echo high and loud: "World Peace."

A renter's viewpoint

In the summer 2008 issue of the Briarcrest Neighborhood News, Bill Bear talked about ways to get renters involved with their community. For Sigrid Anne Strom, involvement started when one fir too many was felled. Strom moved to her Fircrestarea duplex three years ago, drawn to the area's neighborly feel and – as a birder – by the firs and other native

About a year and a half ago, she watched Seattle City Light top trees along 15th to clear them from power lines. As a former Seattle tree steward, she opposes topping as a pruning method. Then she watched an absentee property owner clear his lot of two huge fir trees plus smaller ones. The barren lot is still undeveloped.

She went to City Hall and, with the help of Councilmember Janet Way and staff, was able to save a single tree. Her experience taught her something. "I was upset that my immediate neighborhood was changing radically and, as a renter, I felt that I had no say." Suddenly, she felt that people listened.

When she heard about the formation of the Southeast Neighborhoods Subarea Planning Citizen Advisory Committee, Strom, a technical writer, saw an opportunity to get involved. "This is my home – this is where I live, even though I am a renter." Her involvement has emboldened her to talk to other renters about neighborhood issues. "If they have a voice, they will become part of the social fabric of the community."

So far, the 15-member advisory committee has developed a decision-making framework and has engaged in "robust - not heated, but robust" discussions about how the Briarcrest and Ridgecrest neighborhoods should develop. The committee has developed a level of trust and she is optimistic that it will be able to articulate a vision for the neighborhood and that the city will listen.

Culmination of Shoreline's Visioning Conversations

The Town Hall meeting on Wednesday November 19th had high community energy with good turnout. While everyone sat at large round tables in the Shoreline Room, four Planning Commissioners spoke of themes they observed in 20 Community Conversations. At each table, people were encouraged to consider the "snippets" and themes. The Public Comments at the end were constructive and the meeting ended on time yet many stayed beyond 9:30 p.m. to visit.

The next steps to this visioning process include submitting whole ideas, Community Concepts, to the city by Dec. 22. They will be sent out electronically for peer review and any revisions due before the second Round Table on January 8, 2009. The City Council is seeking different viewpoints from the community in their legislation-writing efforts and the Community Concepts will be posted for public viewing and access.

Nurse Suzanne Receives Award

On November 19th, Briarcrest resident Suzanne Gillette was honored as the 2008 "Woman of Light" by the Women's Housing Equality and Enhancement League (WHEEL) at its annual Homeless Women's Forum. Suzanne recently retired after a 34-year career in nursing. She taught nursing at the university level and volunteered in shelters for homeless women for most of her 20 years in the Seattle area. The last six years she was Parish Nurse at Mary's Place, a safe and welcoming community center for homeless women and children.

Suzanne often saw up to 14 patients a day and conducted weekly health and nutrition classes. Despite the long hours and sometimes sad situations, she reflects fondly on her career. "Even though I was the one charged with counseling and teaching, I never stopped learning from the women I met."

Marisa's Day

For the owner of Lupe's Tienda of Shoreline, October 5th wasn't business as usual. This day allowed her to honor the memory of her daughter and raise awareness of domestic violence. The 200-plus walkers who came to Green Lake that brisk, brilliant autumn day to mark "Steps Against Domestic Violence Day" received handmade pins that reflected a mother's love. Lupe Peach's daughter, Marisa, died at the hands of her fiancé on January 5, 2007. The walk raised over \$7,000 to benefit New Beginnings (newbegin.org) which in 2007 served over 9,000 callers to the 24-hour Help Line. The guest speaker, Governor Gregoire's husband Mike, read the proclamation signed by the Governor to recognize October 5th as the day of remembrance for all victims of domestic violence in the State of Washington.
