Over the past few months, we partnered with *Patty Pan Co-operative* and the City of Shoreline and delivered hundreds of free, healthy meals to low-income seniors as they isolated themselves at home. Our neighbors at *Shoreline United Methodist Church* built a Little Free Food Pantry, located at 14511 - 25th Ave NE, which the BNA helps to keep well-stocked. The Little Pantry offers free food items as well as cloth masks for virus protection! "Take what you need, leave what you can."

Again, I and the entire BNA Leadership Team hope that our neighbors are staying safe and healthy. We can make progress against the pandemic if we all, as a community, diligently comply with recommended health practices like social distancing, wearing a mask, and staying home if we feel ill. New: Little Free Pantry

Prince of Peace Lutheran Church, 14514 20th Ave. NE, has a new Eagle Scout Project—a Little Free Pantry, on 20th Ave. NE, in the garden plot in our parking lot. The motto is: *Take What You Need, Give What You Can.*

We invite & encourage Briarcrest Neighbors to join in this project with us!

Our goal is to stock:

- 1) Nonperishable food items such as soups, beans, canned vegetables & fruits, ramen. Dry goods may be OK as well, if the packaging is durable.
- 2) Toiletries — Soap, toothpaste, feminine hygiene items, diapers repackaged in small packages (there's no room for 12-18 diapers in this LITTLE Free Pantry)
- 3) Small packages of pet food — for pets, this may be downsized from your supply into zip lock bags.

Please do NOT repackage human food in smaller baggies/containers.

We look forward to making a difference in our neighborhood with you!

Build a Talent Bank for Your Neighborhood

During emergencies (like a pandemic or an earthquake) sometimes the people you will rely on live right in your neighborhood. In the last few months, you may have gotten to know your neighbors better. On many Shoreline blocks, neighbors have reached out to help, offering to pick up groceries or check with people who live alone. They have helped build resilient neighborhoods, ones that can survive, adapt, and thrive in the face of change.

In years past, on the second Tuesday in August, Shoreline neighbors have come together to celebrate National Night Out. It is a time to block off streets, share food, and get to know each other better. Unfortunately, this year we won't be able to do that. That doesn't mean we can't still work to build resilient neighborhoods!

We have created a [Talent Bank Worksheet Template](#) available at [shorelinewa.gov/NN0](#). Work with your neighbors to create a talent bank to inventory your block's combined skills and resources. Is someone in your neighborhood a medical professional? Is someone tech savvy or good with power tools? Are there any CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) members on your block? Are there people that can speak multiple languages that could help with interpretation or translations? Continuing to maintain social distance, talk with your neighbors when you see them outside. Or, if you have contact information, invite them to join the talent bank.

Not all your neighbors may want to share personal information or be involved. Please respect their choice.

The City supports building deeper connections at the neighborhood level to create a safer, more responsive community.

Once information is shared, make copies of the completed worksheet so every household can have one. These lists are confidential. They should not be distributed to anyone other than those who have agreed to participate.
