Initiative 1491

On April 10, a group of neighbors met at the home of Briarcrest residents Ian and Marcia Taylor to hear about "Moms Demand Action," a group dedicated to reducing gun violence by promoting common-sense legislation. The audience of 16 heard about Moms' rapidly-growing membership (now 3.5 million nationally) and legislative successes such as Initiative 594, the Background Check requirement, which was supported by Moms and passed by Washington State voters in 2014. They also heard about the State Legislature's repeated failure to act on legislation which would allow family members to get court orders temporarily preventing firearms access by persons exhibiting mental illness, violent or other behavior indicating they may harm themselves or others. Too often in such cases there is a tragic shooting, a suicide, or both. In the face of the legislature's failure to act, Moms members are supporting Initiative 1491, which will create Extreme Risk Protection Orders (ERPO). Members are collecting signatures to put the proposal on the November ballot.

Marilyn Balcerak, whose son shot and killed his stepsister and himself last year, despite Marilyn's pleas to the Seattle police to keep him from accessing a firearm, is the Citizen Sponsor of I-1491 and spoke movingly at the meeting. "The SPD told me they could do nothing to stop my son from arming himself because he had committed no crime," she said. "We need a way to prevent these shootings from happening. I-1491 will give us that."

Cowboy Poetry, Story and Song



On April 1, the BNA and Northwest Heritage Resources partnered to present an evening of Coast Salilsh stories presented by well-known Native American storyteller Roger Fernandes. The event was well attended by adults and children of all ages. The Fircrest Chapel provided a lovely venue with excellent acoustics, and BNA members brought snacks and drinks.

We are again joining forces with Northwest Heritage Resources. This evening promises to be great fun for all ages with a performance of cowboy poetry, stories and songs, featuring award-winning cowboy poet Sharon "Silver" Glenn of Yakama, her cowboy musician husband, George Thomsen, and rancher, farmer and cowboy poet Glenn Bair.

Sharon was born in the Ellensburg area, daughter of a cowboy father and a homesteader's daughter, and grew up surrounded by horses and livestock. She and her husband George have lived the cowboy life for many years, working for local cattle and sheep outfits. George is a lifetime buckaroo and horse trainer. Together they perform as the musical duo Northfork, singing traditional cowboy songs of the rural west, as well as songs of George's own composition and Sharon's poetry.

Glenn Bair grew up cattle ranching and farming in Ephrata, and like Sharon and George, his poetry and songs are true stories from the cowboy and ranching life he has lived. All three have performed at the well known Cowboy Poetry Gathering in Elko, Nevada; the Charlie Russell Cowboy Gathering in Lewiston, Idaho; Cowboy Poets of Idaho in Emmett; the Columbia River Cowboy Gathering in Kennewick; Spirit of the West in Ellensburg; the Northwest Folklife Festival; and events throughout the Northwest.
